#### CKCO-TV WINS GOLD

CKCO-TV won awards in 2 Market A categories Series - Quiz and Game Shows/CKCO-TV - Trivia Company Specials - Performing Arts/CKCO-TV - Music Just For You

The best of Programming and Promotion produced by privately owned Canadian Television Stations was honoured at the CanPro Festival. Over 250 Broadcasters from across the country attended, the 13th annual CanPro Festival, at Kitchener's Valhalla Inn from Saturday, March 22nd through Tuesday, March 25th.

CKND-TV, Winnipeg, won the Programming Award for Excellence for its production, "Tramp at the Door" and CITY-TV, Toronto took top Promotion Honours for its "Community Projects" campaign. The TV Guide/TV Hebdo Gold Award for best production by an Educational institution was won by Centennial College for "Media Literacy".

The awards ceremony was held at the University of Waterloo's Humanities Theatre. Lloyd Robertson of CTV and Marguerite Blais of CFTM-TV, Montreal were the hosts.

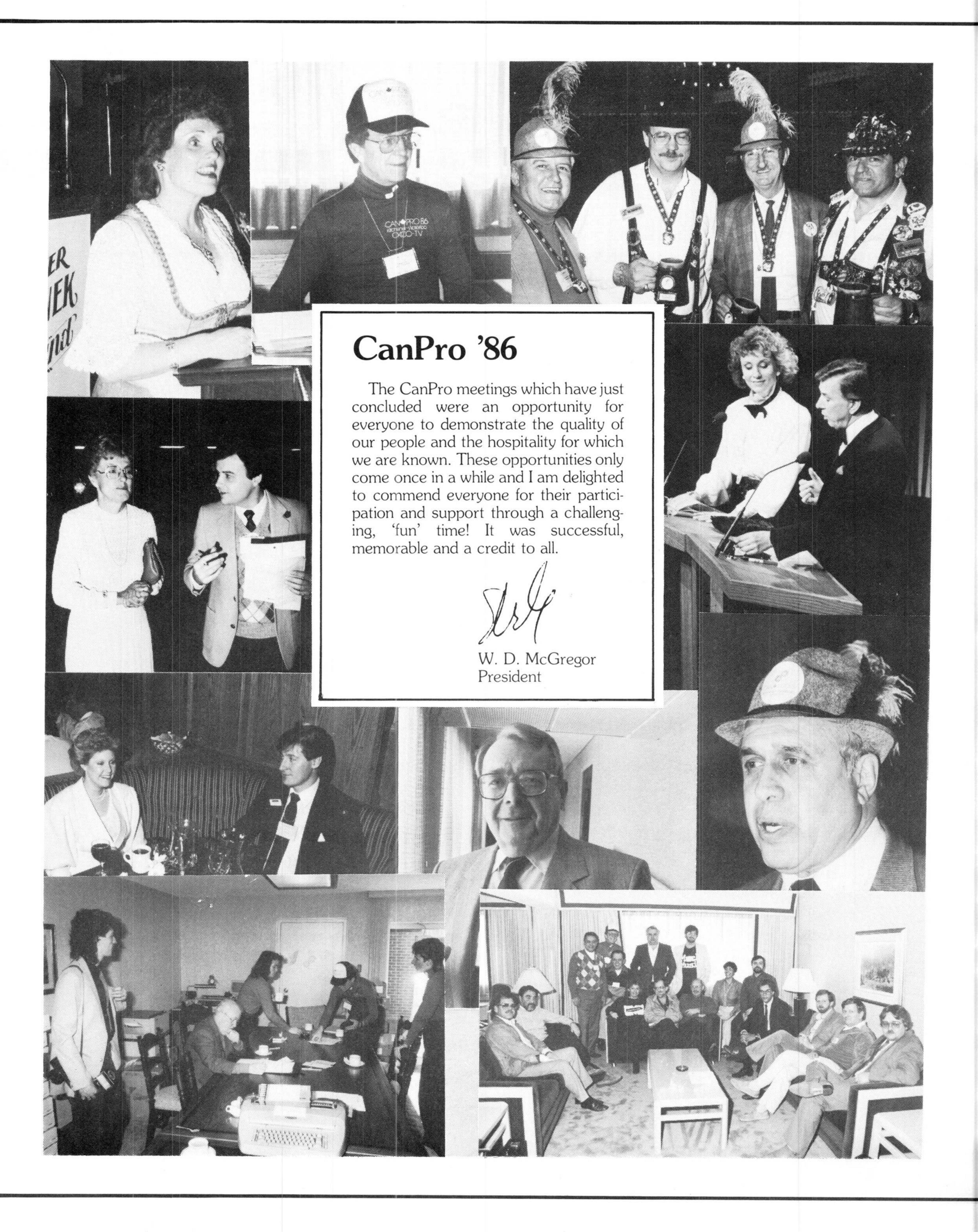
The Honourable Ed Fulton, Ontario Minister of Transportation and Communications ad-

dressed the delegates at the Tuesday luncheon to announce Ontario's willingness to work with Broadcasters on co-productions. Dr. John Twomey of Ryerson Polytechnical Institute announced the formation of a Programming and Promotion Library at Ryerson for access by all Canadian Television Stations.

During the four day festival screenings were held of over 400 Programming and Promotion entries. Workshops focused on such areas as Research, Music and Animation, Cost Effective Production, Archives and Stress Management.

For the first time, all workshops and speeches, as well as the awards presentation were fed by Telsat via satellite to all Television Stations in Canada.

Next year CanPro will be held in Edmonton . . . . Don Willcox will take over the chairman-ship of CanPro after acting as convention chairman this year, and Reg. Sellner has been elected as Chairman of the CanPro Promotion Committee for the Edmonton Proceedings.

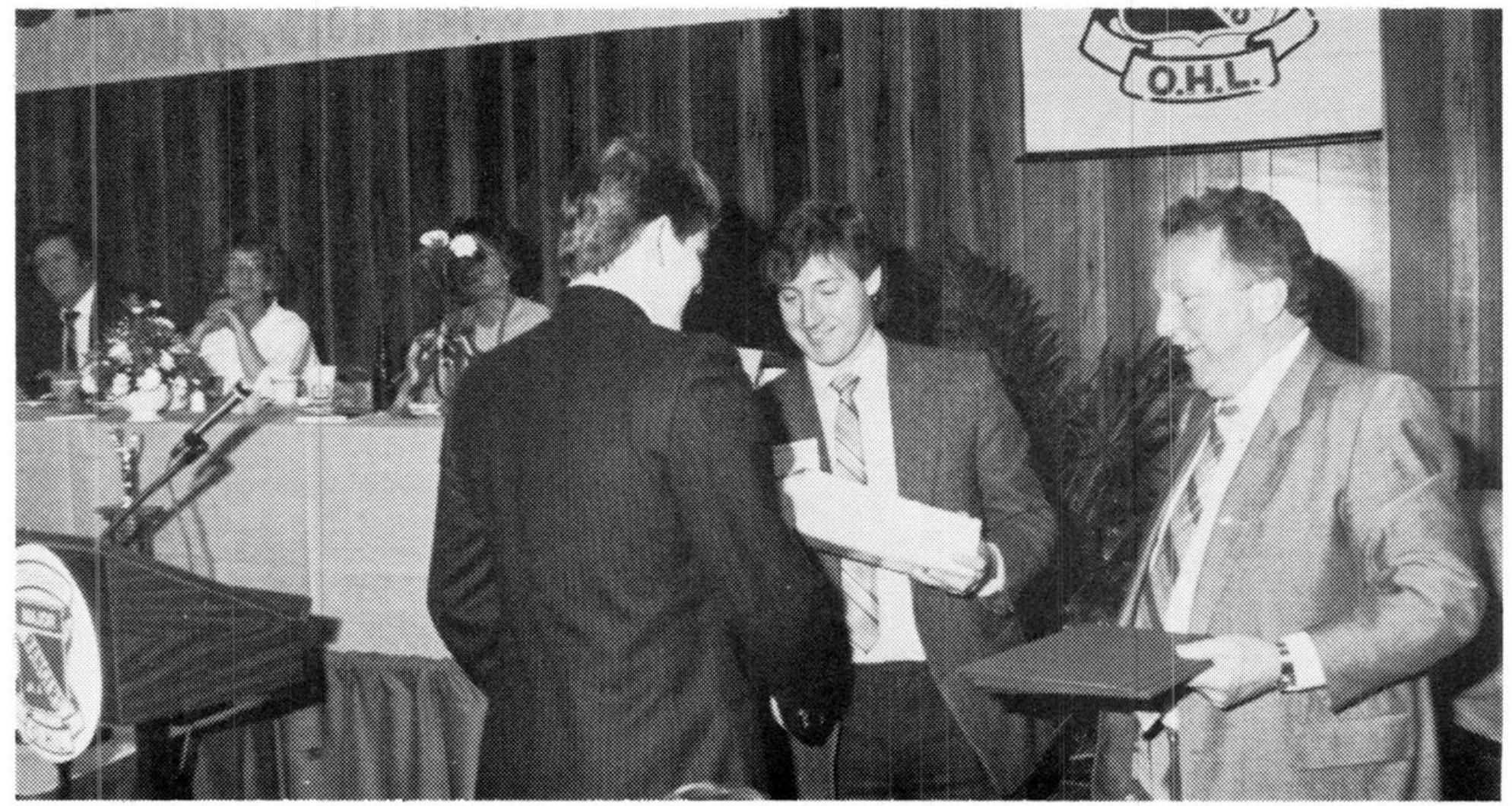

Within a year or two, CFCA's veteran evening announcer Bob Farrow could have himself a farm, one that's been in his family and producing apples since grandpa's day. Bob grew up on the farm, and now two uncles who've worked the land for years are ready to pass it on to the next generation of Farrows.

Even though Bob's 20-odd years in broadcasting have taken him through Cambridge, London, Brantford and Kitchener; he's always maintained contact with the folks back on the farm. Now it looks like Bob will be taking control of the operation. To help prepare himself, Bob has recently become more involved

in the day-to-day life of the farm, putting in three or four mornings a week with his hard-working uncles. "I've got a lot to learn," says Bob.

The Farrow's farm business does well. Apples are sold at the front gate, at the Cambridge Farmers' Market and to cider and apple butter plants in Wellesley. But Bob envisions new markets for those juicy macs, spys, courtlands and delicious apples. "The coffee-and-doughnut shops are really getting into apple fritters in a big way," says Bob, "and that could be big for us." Bob is also considering the purchase of a cider mill, to make that tasty beverage right on the farm. And peaches, pears, plums and cherries may be an important part of the farm's harvest someday.

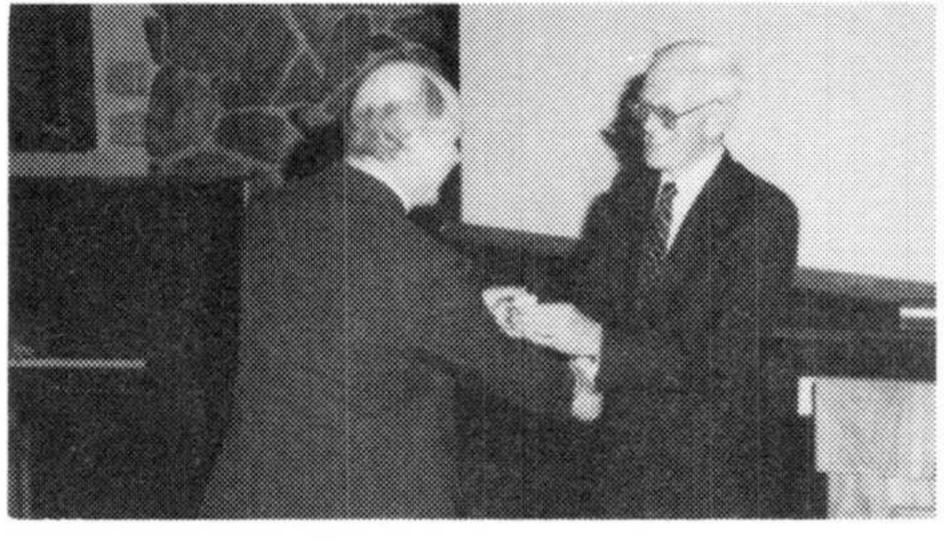
Bob stresses, however, that he doesn't want to get too sophisticated about the

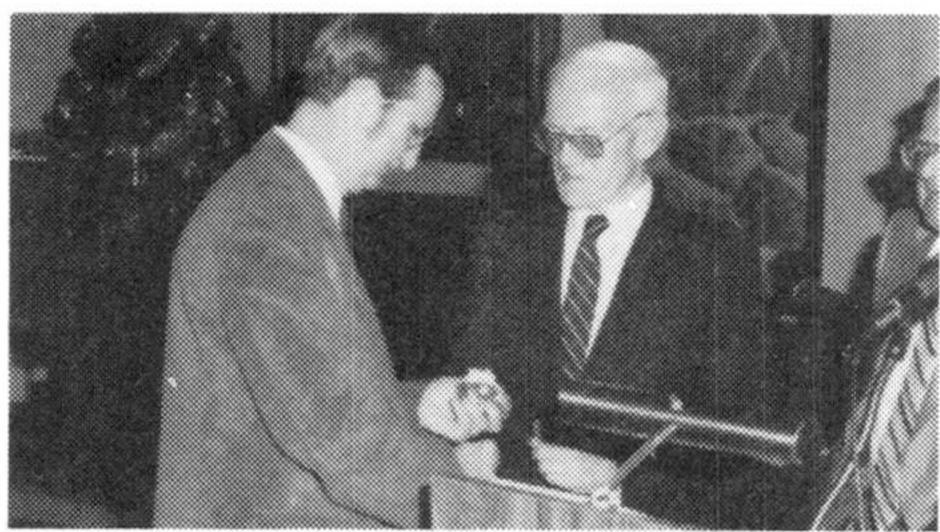
business of selling fruit. He still has a lot of fun helping his uncles with apple sales early in the morning at the Galt Farmers' Market in Cambridge. You might see him there sometime!

# The Greying of the Tube Gang

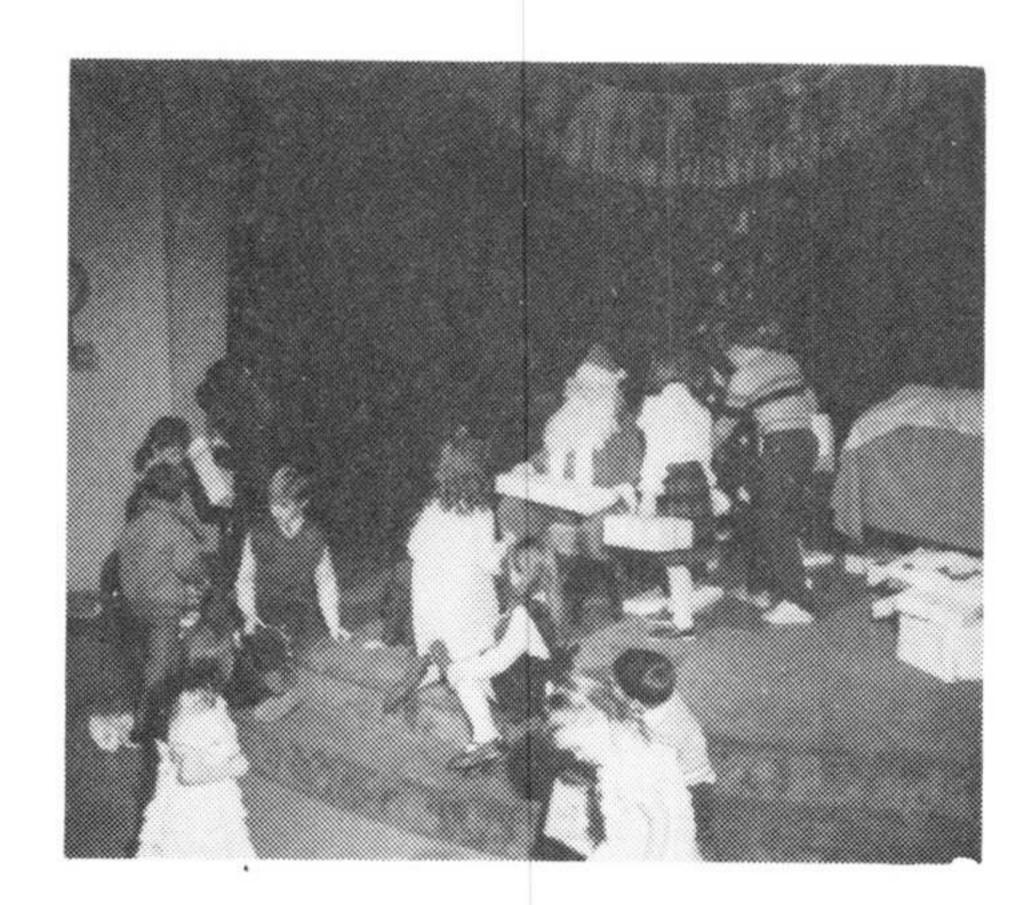

The "China" Syndrome

About 8 years ago, a friend showed Dennis Connolly a collector's plate he had been given as a gift. This particular plate was a scene from the "Gone With the Wind" series. Dennis and his wife Mary expressed some interest in this particular plate, so their friend decided to send their name to the company who offers this type of plates for sale, through the mail. Once the brochures and order forms started arriving, a new hobby began.

One of the companies offering these plates, the Bradford Exchange, offers many different series throughout the year. Some of the series include "Norman Rockwell", "The King and I", "Gone With the Wind" "Oklahoma" and many others, with one or two plates from each series being offered each year. A large series can run over a course of 10 years or more, from the first selection to the final edition. Some imported selections are available also. Limited quantities of each place are produced with each plate bearing an issue number and date of firing.

Collections can be considered a longterm investment, as the value does increase over a period of time. Occasionally, due to circumstances, a particular plate or series will soar in value very quickly. (An example would be the "King and I Series" featuring Yul Brenner, which increased in value after the actor's death.) To maintain the plates in mint condition and preserve their investment value, they must be kep in a controlled environment. The ceramic surface is porous, so a dust free, moisture free, cabinet to display the plates is required. Currently the near 100 plates in Dennis' collection are stored in their original packaging. He is planning to build a display cabinet eventually, and will perhaps show one series at a time.

While there is an investment value in a plate collection, the true pleasure is in simply enjoying them, like any other artwork. Such collections gather sentimental value, that can be passed on from generation to generation.

Now Dennis can only wait and hope that a series will be produced featuring Andy Donato's best work!
