Kitchener Rangers and CKKW on the Move — UP

It's summertime and the living is easy — and it's also hot but it's still time to talk about hockey and in particular the Kitchener Rangers of the Ontario Hockey League.

Last year was not the best of times for the Rangers. In fact, it was closer to the worst of times as the team struggled to make the playoffs and lost four straight to the Windsor Spitfires. That all sounds bad but the good news is the Rangers stayed with youth last year and should be rewarded with improved play from Steven Rice, Rival Fullum (The Nook of the North) and Tyler Ertel this year.

They are the youngest of a good crop of returning players, the likes of Darren Rumble, Cory Keenan, Randy Pearce (The Pride of Elmira), Richard Borgo (not


Victor's son) and Mark Montanari (He calls player-agent Gus Badali "uncle") that should make the Rangers First Division Contenders in the Emms Division.

The OHL held what they call the "Priority Draft of Midget Players" in Toronto on May 28th. The Rangers, drafting fifth, took defenceman Brad Barton of Pickering first. He will play and so will the second pick goaltender Mike Torchia from the Toronto Midget Red Wings. The experts call The Affable Torchia "The second coming of "Gump Worsely". The Rangers hope these "experts" are right. Two other newcomers to watch are center Jason Firth from Ottawa and fourth round pick Sean Stansfield from Belleville. Firth is compared to a "Water-Bug" (that means he's


quick) and Stansfield is smaller but much like former Kitchener Star, Shawn Burr, now with the Detroit Red Wings.

After four years of frustration the Rangers appear ready to move up, in fact the fans are almost demanding it. It will not be easy, other teams in the Emms division have also improved and there's always a few surprises but count on the Rangers to be there and count on CKKW-RADIO to be part of it all.

This year CKKW will again be the "Voice of the Kitchener Rangers" but the broadcasting schedule will be slightly different. All road games will be broadcast from start to finish and on the home games there will be four cut-ins per hour. Good days ahead for the Kitchener Rangers and CKKW.


Don Luce and a galaxy of former National Hockey League stars will take to the auditorium ice.

Tickets for staff members will be available through the promotion and public relations department for a nominal fee.



All's well with CFCA at Stratford


Monday, May 30, 1988, Opening Night of The Stratford Theatre's 36th Season and CFCA is there. Appropriately tuxedoed for the occasion, veteran broadcaster Bob Farrow takes to the airwaves from his canopied perch above the main entrance of the Festival Theatre—a privileged vantage point which CFCA has been invited to occupy for the past five years. This is a particularly exciting evening for The Festival, poised on the threshold of a season which has already generated a record-breaking seven million dollars in advance ticket sales.

Weeks of careful preparation have gone into this special broadcast. Production, Creative, Traffic and Art Departments have all done their part to ensure that CFCA sounds and looks its best on location. Bob Farrow has spoken with the director and principal actors involved in the opening night production of Richard III. Portions of his pre-taped interviews are to be aired throughout the evening, along with some complimentary material provided by CKCO's Stephanie Slater. In addition to her duties as a news reporter Stephanie co-hosts "Arts Album" for Television. Her in-depth interviews with members of The Festival Company and clips from preview performances provide CFCA listeners with more than a superficial view of what this season has to offer.





they hurry by to attend a pre-theatre reception.











OLYMPIC WINDUP


CAP Golf Tournament Another Success!!



Answers to these and other probing questions in the next issue of Capsule. Maybe.



Former PD Larry Gavin has been moved to Ottawa, to work in the area of Program Development . . . in Ottawa and Pembroke . . .






CKCO-TV "Charlie" Awards

The CKCO-TV "Charlie" Awards have been a significant part of The Waterloo County High School English Awards for the past ten years. During each of these years awards sponsored by CKCO-TV have been given to secondary school students who have manifested excellence in videomaking and filmmaking.

Winning students receive \$400.00 in cash, trophies, certificates, and Banquet dinners. The winner of the best three videos receives \$300.00 (\$100.00 for each film) and the best "overall" video receives an additional \$100.00.

Judges for the CKCO-TV "Charlie" Awards have included CKCO-TV personnel such as John Arajs and Frances Russell. The judging of the Awards occurs approximately two weeks prior to the English Awards in May. Immediately after the judging session the top three videos are announced. The best "overall" video is announed, however, two weeks later at the English Awards Banquet (well calculated to keep the student in suspense). At the Banquet the Awards are presented by the judge representing CKCO-TV.

The major aim of the CKCO-TV "Charlie" Awards is to provide a festival and awards which allow secondary student video and film makers to communi-






