
#### ACR-225 "Did You Knows"

CKCO is the first broadcaster in Canada to have purchased an AMPEX ACR-225. This new machine will eventually replace our two older ACR-225's. To honour the memory of these fine old machines the numbers will be retired, with the new machine becoming known as "ACR-3".

"ACR-3" is a digital video recorder, the pictures are recorded as a series of numbers called bytes that describe the picture content. The ACR-225 records these numbers at a rate of 132,000,000 bytes per second, which by any ones count is a lot. The machine also holds up to 248 cartridges. Each cartridge will hold up to 64 "30 second" spots or 15,872 spots in the machine. "ON LINE". If you are counting that's 476,160,000,000 bytes or 132.26 hours of video.

The machine also records four 20 bit digital audio tracks as well. A compact disk only uses 16 bits to record audio (the ACR-225 is 16 times better!).

All of these great things come with a price. Our Operations staff will have to become VERY computer literate to use either the router or ACR-3. This should be an easy task for this group, most are already quite used to bits and bytes.



### Routing Switcher "Did You Knows"

Engineering is in the midst of the largest installation in the history of CKCO TV. We have a new routing switcher. This switcher forms the heart of Master Control, routing and rerouting signals and programs through some 2,000 video connections and over 24,000 audio connections.

Operations will no longer have to plug, stick, drag, or patch a myriad of cords into the patch bays just so News can record a feed from the southwest. Nor will there be a mad scramble when Wayne Kooyman wants to record the

The new Routing Switcher will allow News, Sports, Edit Suites, Production and Master immediate access to over 60 Video sources and 50 audio Sources in Full Stereo (where available). In short we will be able to connect any piece of equipment to any other piece of equipment with nothing more than a push of a button. "Engineering", "We bring good things to Life."

Our new Ampex ACR 225 automatic spot player was just about ready to leave California and we had ordered a new television routing switcher. We are now receiving cable substitution in the City of Windsor, and our ACR 225 has arrived; has been installed and is undergoing final testing before coming on-stream. Our routing switcher has also arrived and is being installed. That's progress!

In the last issue of CAPSULE, I commented on the very intense effort being made on AM109 as we introduced a new format to listeners in the Kitchener-Waterloo area. I am very happy to announce that the BBM ratings just released, certainly show the results of that effort. Our ratings for listeners between the ages of 18 and 34 (our target audience) have shown a great improvement from 12 months ago. This is tangible evidence of the hard work being expended by everyone involved with AM109. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate, in particular, Brian Currie and the onair staff for the fantastic effort they have put into AM109 over the last six months. I would be remiss if I bypassed

AM109's sales department, because sales figures certainly have improved as well. Everyone is certainly very excited about this improvement and look forward to that day when Brian delivers a number one AM radio station (I won't let you forget your statement Brian).

Those same BBM ratings certainly indicate that CFCA continues to dominate the radio market designed for older demographics and the fine tuning suggested by a recent consultant's report will only improve upon those ratings.

As you are all now aware, pay equity has become a major issue within the broadcast industry and in particular here at CAP Communications. Federal legislation demands that Equal Pay for Work of Equal Value be put into place within the next year or so. Recent meetings with the executive of our NABET local and with each of you as employees certainly will expedite our pay equity arrangement. As you know, we have recently arranged so that employees, if they desire, may retire at the age of 62 with full benefits and the implications of that early retirement option should be fully explained on June 20th.


As you are aware, our parent company Electrohome Communications, continues to seek out new broadcast properties to be added to CAP Communications and Sunwapta in Edmonton. One of those properties is Mid-Canada Communications with extensive television and radio operations in Sudbury, Timmins, North Bay and other northern Ontario locations. As I write this CAPSULE

report, no final decision has been announced by Mid-Canada; however, you can be assured if we are not the successful applicant there will be other properties which Electrohome Communications will bid for as they become available in the near future.

We will all miss Bill and Percy and to their families we extend our condolences.

CAN PRO is an annual festival designed to promote and develop private television in Canada, and to honour locally produced TV programs and promotions.



Baldwin offer singalong songs, stories, games and off-the-wall fun packaged together in a fast-paced half hour by director, Paul Francescutti.







AM 109 presents Summer Fashions at Stages.




AM 109's Tino Monte on Stage.







## W.H.M.I.S.

W.H.M.I.S. These are the initials of a new workplace health and safety information system. The initials stand for WORK-PLACE HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INFORMATION SYSTEM, but the idea they express is also known as the RIGHT TO KNOW. It is a Canada-wide system to provide employers and workers with information about the hazardous materials they work with on the job to protect their health and safety. WHMIS is the outcome of four years of consultation and negotiation among federal and provincial governments, industry and organized labour. Its rules apply in every province and territory, as well as workplaces covered by federal law.


WHMIS gives everyone in the work place the right to know about the hazards of materials used in the workplace. It does this by means of:

- warning labels on containers of hazardous materials;
- separate safety data sheets providing further detailed information (know as Material Safety Data Sheets or MSDS);
- worker training on how to use this information.

If you have not noticed a WHMIS label in your area, check the fire extinguisher near you. It should have the new WHMIS label and new hazard symbol.



# What Was All the Stink About?

On Tuesday, April 4th, there was commotion around our building when an unknown, strong odour permeated the TV Traffic and News departments. After clearing out most of the employees in these areas, officials from the Fire department, the City of Kitchener maintenance and gas departments, Roberts Electric, Oscar Wiles Construction, and our own "experts" converged on the area to determine the source of the fumes. ("When there's something strange, in the neighbourhood, Who you gonna call . . . 'Gas Busters'!!") What was discovered was a wet trap, a part of the "invisible" plumbing, that had dried out, allowing sewer gas to back up through the pipes. (Normally, water fills the wet trap to prevent any sewer gas from backing up.) When the gas got into the plumbing, it was eventually picked up by the air conditioner, which then spread fumes through the office. So, it wasn't pleasant while it lasted . . . but it also wasn't dangerous! Just another memorable day at CAP.
