- AM109 increased its audience 27% from a year ago
- AM109 remained even with their audience of the Fall
- CFCA increased its audience 25% from Spring a year ago




#### CAPGOLF by Hutch

JOHN HASLIP of our Chatham News Bureau is retiring at the end of June. He'll be 64 in a few weeks and plans to take it easy for awhile, working part time in the bureau. John has seen a lot of changes over the years and I asked him to put down some thoughts for CAPsule readers. Here's what he's come up with.



### A lifetime of television

Television is almost as natural as breathing for most of today's generation. For most people today, changing technology does not come as a new revelation. For many of us older folk, the pace of the change sometimes seems mind boggling. I am as old as television itself. I have experienced almost all of the changes first hand.

Television was developed in the early 1930's, believe it or not, in England. The American public got its first glimpse of the new electronic marvel at the 1939 New York World's Fair. The cameras were big, bulky things set on movie camera tripods, and equipped with three lenses. About 200 television sets were able to receive the black and white images broadcast live from the fairgrounds. Video tape did not exist. World War Two put the mass production of television receivers for the home market on hold. All electronic production was diverted to the war effort producing radio equipment, and radar.

My professional career in television began in 1948. I worked briefly for an appliance dealer, installing television antennas. An eight inch Admiral set cost 300 dollars. The average worker was earning 50 dollars a week.

Channel 4 Detroit came on the air at 4:00 p.m., and you had to wait until then to make sure the antenna was pointed in

the right direction. Most stations went off the air at 11:00 p.m.; no late movies in those days. A picture was acceptable unless the snow was so bad you couldn't make out what was being broadcast. Live programmes were later copied on film, a process known as kinescope. The quality was poor but thanks to kinescope many productions now considered classics of early television were preserved.

TV news was shot on black and white film. Only the Studio Cameras were electronic, using vacuum tubes.

In the late 1960's I started working as a stringer for CFPL using a spring wound Bolex 16 mm hand held film camera. A light metre was a must. I still have 2 Bolex 16 mm cameras in the "Haslip Museum". In the mid 1970's, CFPL started using 16 mm colour film, improving the quality and clarity over the old black and white.

In 1975 I joined CKCO-TV as the first and only bureau chief for Channel 42 area. Technology was on its ever changing course. My next camera was a used, company issue Scoopic 16, complete with automatic exposure, so the light metre could be left at home.

News gathering in those days, meant shooting the visuals, putting the film on the bus, and then phoning in the information. The news format had the anchor voicing all the news stories. (Radio with pictures.) Audio tape recorders were introduced to improve our field reporting. Now we could get comments from individuals. Telephone quality was no longer acceptable; the voicer, on audio tape, went along with the film, by bus to Kitchener. Late breaking news had to be driven to Kitchener to make that day's cast.

1978 was notable for two events. On April 13 I underwent quadruple bypass surgery. Thank God medical technology has been moving ahead along with the electronics industry. Then in late 1978 CKCO moved into the video age. The bureaus didn't. I inherited a CP 16 sound film camera, and began learning the techniques of doing on camera interviews. Film cost 25 dollars per 100 foot roll.

The Chatham Bureau got its first video camera in 1979, to cover the International Ploughing Match. We thought it was the electronics marvel of the 20th century. The camera and recorder together weighed somewhat over 30 pounds, and the JVC 4800 recorder had a bad habit of shutting down during Kent County's humid summers. We solved that problem by placing the recorder in the car, with the heater running full blast in 30

Celsius weather. The tapes, like the film that preceded them, were bussed to Kitchener for editing.


The first microwave link at London meant we didn't have to ship the tapes as far, or drive as far to get late breaking stories in. When Sarnia was hooked into the system, it meant we only had a 45 minute drive, each way, every day, to file our stories.

Now of course, we have our own microwave, laptop computer, and cellular phone. We can be in constant touch with anyone.

Technology keeps changing, and CKCO will keep changing with it to keep up with the demands of the public. I believe that in the future we will see microwave equipped trucks and helicopters as part of our news gathering system, not just the big American stations. Eventually we will get camcorders without moving parts. The tape will be replaced by a microchip. Will we then be able to dispense with the microwaves, and feed the "viz" over the phone, the way we do our computer scripts now? Probably. How about a miniature camera so small Chris Duncan can walk into any company manager's office without him being aware he is on camera? "Saturday Night Live" has a segment with a tv reporter wearing a helmet equipped with a miniature camera and microwave dish. This may become a reality sooner than we think, as technology continues to make everything smaller, faster, lighter.

The real challenge for management will be to use the technology to deliver the news rather than the technology determining what the news will be.
