
"Wow, that's a heck of a lot of popcorn ...


- Their worships the Mayors of Kitchener and Waterloo agreed to declare June 26th 'POPCORN TUESDAY'.


## Inaugural Quarter Century Club Meeting

## CKCO-TV Increases Coverage (Service) in Huntsville-Muskoka Region and Improves Signal Quality of Channel 13 Transmitter in Kitchener

In October of 1989 the CRTC (Canadian Radio and Television Commission) approved the application of CKCO-TV for a power increase for their Channel 11 transmitter, serving the Huntsville-

Muskoka area from Dwight Ontario.


Extensive construction and renovations have now been completed at the Dwight location that now enables CKCO-TV to transmit a signal of 325,000 watts, the maximum allow-

able. This is eight (8) times more power than the previous signal.

As well as vastly improving the present service to the area, the new power will also extend coverage as far south as Lake Simcoe, beyond Sundridge in the north, west and southwest to Parry Sound and Victoria Harbour, and Whitney to the east.

In keeping with CKCO-TV's policy of constantly striving to improve service in all it's areas, the transmitter in Kitchener has also undergone considerable upgrading. To keep pace with the changing technology a 30 kilowatt, Larcan, solid state transmitter has been added at the Baden site for Channel 13 viewers to enjoy a more reliable and constant signal...

CKCO-TV has been serving the Huntsville-Muskoka area on Channel 11 since 1975 . . . and the Southwestern Ontario Region on Channel 13 since 1954.




New Channel 11 transmitter building at Dwight.
















## "Classic" Coverage From CKCO-TV by Jeff Hutcheson

When the best lady golfers on the LPGA tour converged on Kitchener's Westmount Golf and Country Club the last weekend of June, so did CKCO-TV. The tournament, the du Maurier Ltd Classic, is one of four "major championship" events on the Ladies Pro Tour. CKCO jumped in head first with coverage and sponsorship. Back in February, meetings and planning began for what would be CKCO contributions in three major areas.

First, the CKCO-TV-Coca-Cola Golf Clinic. Undoubtedly, the biggest and most successful promotion of the week. This was held the Tuesday of Tournament Week with 300 lucky participants taking part, getting their instruction from 10 LPGA pros. Many of the golfers there had won their tickets on contests prior to the tournament on CKCO-TV and CFCA-FM. Each golfer got a special CKCO-TV-Coke towel and these soon became the prize souvenir of the week. I was the Master of Ceremonies for this event, and you may have heard that LPGA pro Jill Briles and I had a driving contest. Well, it's true she outdrove me. But you may have heard she beat me by driving the ball 275 yards while on her knees! That's just not true . . . I don't think she hit it anymore than 250!! At any rate, much behind the scenes work has to be attributed to Reg Sellner and his department for giving CKCO such high profile at this clinic.

Second, CKCO-TV produced a half hour special for the CTV network called "The Ladies." This was the first such show of its kind done for the network and the response was overwhelming. If CKCO and Producer Tom Keller don't win a Can Pro Award for this show, then they should stop giving out awards. If you saw it, you know how good it was . . . Bill Inkol travelled to Nashville a month before the Kitchener stop to talk to "The Ladies" of the tour. Messers Keller and Dunseith travelled later to Corning New York to get more footage for the show. Shooting was completed in Kitchener at Westmount with Tournament Chairman and former Canadian Golf Great Jocelyn Bourassa and yours truly.

Third, during Tournament Week, CKCO was front and centre with coverage "Live" from Westmount. From Wednesday thru Sunday, CKCO did the sports portion of the Scan Newshour live from the course. This was made possible by News Producer Paul Francescutti,

Technician Zeljko Zugaj and Cameraman Chris Matlock, along with the crew in Master and Production Control who were on duty those nights. CKCO had installed a microwave dish at Westmount, and with the help of some loaner patio furniture from John Hauser Ironworks, we set up shop behind the third tee. And did we get lucky! The plan was to get the leader on live each night, and each night, Cathy Johnson just kept coming back

and back again. When she joined our set after her first ever win on the tour, her first words were . . . "All right, I made it all four nights!" . . . and so did we!

With CTV televising the final two rounds of the tournament, CKCO-TV had coverage the likes of which the sponsors had never seen before ... and likely won't see again, unless they return to Kitchener.


Reg Sellner attended the briefings to talk about the power increases in the Channel 11 area. From all reports the signal is looking extremely good.








